This approach was used because of the other public-private partnership sustainability studies funded by the Region 3 Council over the last two years. These studies supported the work of Virginia's Growth Alliance in the eastern subregion and the formation of a new regional economic development organization through the work of the Commonwealth Regional Council in the northern subregion.

A summary of the project and the complete application are attached.

PROJECT REVIEW COMMITTEE (PRC) RECOMMENDATION:

The PRC recommends approval of the application as proposed because of its alignment with the goals of the 2023 Growth & Diversification Plan to promote and support sustainable regional economic development organizations in all three (3) subregions. The PRC further found that the application is similar to the prior applications approved for Virginia's Growth Alliance and the Commonwealth Regional Council.

The SVRA and supporting localities have delivered a strong return on investment to the region in recruitment and retention efforts. From the original formation, funders at the Virginia Economic Development Partnership and Virginia Tobacco Commission encouraged them to make the alliance a public-private partnership and extend opportunities to industry-led solutions to support talent attraction and retention efforts within the regional market. With the well-established structure for support of local and regional economic industry recruitment and retention, SVRA has a solid foundational structure and plan for supporting



capacity building to sustain efforts to enhance the region's gross domestic product by adding private sector participation and guidance.

5. **Project budget and sources of matching funds**.

The budget of \$75,784.98 would provide \$32,500 for the feasibility study and \$2,500 for their associated travel by the contracted staff. \$2,800 would be provided for an 8% support organization management of the grant. Matching funds will be provided by \$24,250.20 cash contribution for salary for 135 hours from the Executive Director to assist with the planning and implementation of the study, to identify companies for participation, along with the SVRA administrative staff support of 300 hours to book calls, meetings, and provide marketing and operational support for the contract team. Cash for the associated SVRA staff benefits would include \$6,634.78. In addition, SVRA would provide \$1000 cash for marketing supplies and \$2,500 SVRA staff travel to support the project. Localities are also committing strategic guidance to identify private sector experts and the progression of the study with 4 hours per month for three months from 3 economic developers/SVRA Board Members at an average of \$75 per hour for \$3,600 in local in-kind support. They also participate in the strategic and operational guidance for SVRA as members of the Board of Directors.

6. Alignment with the Region 3's Growth and Diversification Plan.

To strengthen the sustainability and long-term survival of a regional economic development organization, stakeholders must have buy-in to the plan and purpose. The natural evolution is to incorporate a public-private partnership model to increase leadership and support for not just industrial development but also talent development and retention to sustain these efforts.



This proved more difficult in the GO Virginia Region 3 due to limited resources and economy of scale. Significant work in demonstrating the benefits of collaborative effort by governmental bodies of the localities in the western portion of the region has increased success with local site development and regional workforce initiatives. This has enhanced the opportunity to join forces with the private sector to improve future community and economic development initiatives. It also promises to encourage similar efforts across the entire region.

This aligns with the GO Virginia Region 3 Council's goal **to develop an approach to talent attraction and retention by identifying barriers, including childcare and housing**. While this project focuses on expansion to the private sector in the western region of GO Virginia Region 3, it will continue to sustain a model that can be utilized across the entire region. Working with the private sector, SVRA will work to find additional support for community development that includes linking public and private support for greater resources and results.

It also addresses **support for developing strategies and plans to sustain regional approaches to support sustainable regional economic development systems.** The western portion of GO Virginia Region 3 has had great ROI for collaborative work in economic development. Involving the private sector is the next evolution of these efforts, and it promises to complement the efforts in the remainder of the region. Long-term sustainability will depend on the buy-in of community development in conjunction with economic development, and this will require the united support and leadership of the private sector as well as the existing support provided by the public sector.

7. Describe the line of sight from this planning work to an eligible GO Virginia implementation project. Describe the project outcome(s) you hope to gain from this implementation project.

This feasibility study draws from 14 years of successful economic development efforts by coordinating local economic development teams into a regional SVRA collaborative team. The existing SVRA strategic plan and sector analysis are aligned with the GO Virginia Region 3 Growth and Diversification Plan. Localities and regional administration align and support efforts but lack private sector leadership, support, and participation.

This study aligns plans to draw in private sector participation and support and strengthen monetary and leadership support for the long-term survival and success of the SVRA plan. Based on the study's outcomes, SVRA is prepared to launch a private-sector investor campaign immediately. This will include direct support from project management, administrative, and locality support. Without this partnership, SVRA operates at a fraction of the capacity of other regional partnerships across the state. This is a needed next step in the evolution of SVRA.



The Region 3 Council's long-term strategy is to have three sustainable regional economic development organizations in GO Virginia Region 3. These would be SVRA, Virginia's Growth Alliance, and the new one to serve the Commonwealth Regional Council's localities. It is entirely conceivable that these regional economic development organizations could collaborate and pursue a large-scale implementation project. However, each organization must become financially sustainable through public-private partnerships, and this is a critical first step before identifying a specific implementation project or project.

RE: Reappointments_Appointment for 2024-2025

The following is an update concerning membership of the Region 3 Council and its standing committees:

- A vacancy remains on the Region 3 Council for a private-sector representative from the Northern Subregion. A candidate has been identified for appointment and should be presented to the Region 3 Council at its meeting on April 17th.
- Jordan Miles recently advised that he will be relocating to Alexandria and, consequently, must step off as Chair of the Project Review Committee. He wants to share with the Executive Committee that he enjoyed serving, which leaves knowing the GO Virginia Region 3 Council will continue its good work. Jordan served as one of the two citizen members of the Project Review Committee.
- Charley Majors, a long-tenured private sector member of the Region 3 Council since the beginning, agreed to serve through the end of 2023-2024. A replacement candidate is being identified and recruited. If this is successful, his replacement to fill an unexpired term can be appointed at the July 17th meeting.
- Charley Majors has expressed great interest in continuing to serve and add value to the Region 3 Council. Given his interest, the Region 3 Council could appoint him as a non-voting advisor to the Executive Committee.

The bylaws provide that the Region 3 Council "...may appoint committees as deemed necessary to meet the Council requirements... the Virginia Growth and Opportunity Act and to fulfill the duties of the Council." Towards this end, the Project Review Committee is comprised of two (2) Region 3 Council members and two (2) citizen [non-council members] representatives.

An additional consideration is that the Region 3 Council will undergo a transition in membership during the next two (2) reappointment_appiontment cycles. The bylaws limit members to two (2) consecutive four-year terms. There are five (5) members whose term will end on 6.30.25 and who are not eligible for reappointment.

In light of this situation, it would be helpful to the Executive Committee to have a limited number of past members willing to serve as advisors, providing institutional memory and experience during this transition period.

Accordingly, it would be appropriate for the Nominating Committee, with support from the Executive Committee, to recommend to the Region 3 Council at its April 20th meeting that a non-voting advisor to the Executive Committee be added effective July 1st and that Charley Majors be appointed.

Attached is a current copy of the Region 3 Council roster for the 2023-2024 cycle. No members' terms will expire on June 30th.

RE: Southern Virginia Partnership for Health Science Careers (SOVA Partnership)_Modify Contract for Subgrantee Change and Project Update

 Modify Contract for Subgrantee Change – The GO Virginia subgrantee for the SOVA Partnership was initially designated as the West Piedmont Planning District Commission (WPPDC) in Martinsville. This organization is eligible to serve as a subgrantee. In this role, it will process and disburse grant draws and coordinate preparing and submitting reports and close-out documents with DHCD GO Virginia staff. Additionally, WPPDC agreed to receive and disburse a matching grant from the Claude Moore Foundation (CMF) to support the work of the SOVA Partnership.

The WPPDC was also going to employ a contract Executive Director for the SOVA Partnership. GO Virginia and CMF would fund this position. An individual had been engaged in this role last Fall solely with CMF funding and before the GO Virginia planning grant award. The project principals agreed that the position would transition to funding from GO Virginia and CMF at the beginning of 2024. Unfortunately, the individual resigned because of a spouse's job relocation.

In light of this situation, the President of the Blue Ridge Partnership for Health Science Careers (Blue Ridge Partnership), Cynthia Lawrence, agreed to serve as the staff support for the SOVA Partnership. The Blue Partnership had been identified as an organization directly supporting the work of the SOVA Partnership in the GO Virginia grant application.

The Blue Ridge Partnership is an eligible non-profit that can receive and administer GO Virginia grant funds and has administered a similar GO Virginia grant from Region 2. Further, it is eligible to receive and administer the CMF matching grant. Based on discussion among all parties, it is agreed that transferring the GO Virginia and CMF grants from the WPPDC to the Blue Ridge Partnership would be more efficient and effective.

This transfer was presented to DHCD GO Virginia staff, who agreed that, given the circumstances, the contract could be reworked to remove the WPPDC as the Subgrantee and designate the Blue Ridge Partnership as the Subgrantee going forward. To effect this modification, letters from WPPDC, the Blue Ridge Partnership, and a letter from the Region 3 Council requesting this modification should be submitted to DHCD GO Virginia. Once received, the Region 3 Council, the Southside Planning District Commission, and the Blue Ridge Partnership will prepare and execute a revised contract.

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Program Director to coordinate with the West Piedmont Planning District Commission principals, the Blue Partnership for Health Science Careers, and the Region 3 Council Chair to have the contract revised to designate the Blue Ridge Partnership as the SOVA Partnership's Subgrantee.

II. <u>Project Update</u> - The Institute for Advanced Learning and Research in Danville hosted a kickoff meeting for the SOVA Partnership on January 18th. Over 35 representatives from the region's healthcare employers, educators, and allied stakeholders convened to begin this firstof-its-kind effort in Region 3. During the meeting, Cynthia Lawrence with the Blue Ridge Partnership for Health Science Careers and former Secretary of Health Dr. William Hazel with the Claude Moore Foundation gave an overview of the SOVA Partnership's upcoming work and emerging state-wide policies addressing healthcare workforce development.

The SOVA Partnership held its second meeting on March 4th to formulate a work plan and organize several committees. These committees are Talent Pathways, Academic Planning, and IT/Analytics. They will develop an implementation plan targeted for completion this coming fall.

As stated earlier, Ms. Lawrence, who leads the Blue Ridge Partnership, will directly support the SOVA Partnership and its committees. She is receiving additional staffing support from Carilion Clinic.

Attached is a roster of those who attended the kick-off meeting and are populating the committees.

RE: Enhanced Capacity Building Planning Grant_Amelia County Regional Commerce Center

At its October 18, 2023 meeting, the Region 3 Council approved a business site planning grant for the Amelia County Economic Development Authority to complete "due diligence" elements to secure the Virginia Economic Development Partnership's Tier 3 ranking for a 100+ acre property on US Route 360.

Following this action, the application was submitted to DHCD GO Virginia staff for administrative approval in late October 2023. Because of the GO Virginia grant application deadlines in November DHCD staff would not complete its review until after the GO Virginia State Board meeting in early December. The applicant understood the delay in the submission to the review period.

In early December, DHCD GO Virginia staff advised that a qualified engineering firm must complete a "site suitability" assessment before the planning grant would be approved. The purpose of this study was to determine whether the site was suitable for the business sectors cited in the application as aligned with the Region 3 Growth & Diversification Plan. The Amelia County EDA engaged Timmons, a consulting engineering firm familiar with these matters, and the GO Virginia program at its own cost. A copy of the assessment is attached.

A copy of the assessment was submitted to DHCD GO Virginia staff in late January. The staff advised that the assessment did not meet their expectations of what a "site suitability" assessment should address. An example of a "site suitability" assessment was requested so the Amelica County EDA could direct Timmons to produce the requested information. DHCD staff contacted the Virginia Economic Development Partnership for an example, but VEDP declined to share one as it is proprietary information.

The next step was a meeting with the Amelia County EDA representatives, DHCD GO Virginia staff, Timmons representatives, and the Region 3 Program Director, which was held on March 5th. The purpose of this meeting was to understand better what information the DHCD staff wanted in the "site suitability" assessment. DHCD GO Virginia staff gave some guidance on what the assessment should include.

Timmons is preparing this document's scope, budget, schedule, and deliverables. It will likely be completed after the agenda package is distributed to the Executive Committee for the March 20th meeting. Consequently, an update on this matter will be presented at the meeting.

It should be noted that DHCD GO Virginia stated that the GO Virginia funding could be increased to cover the cost of the "site suitability" assessment. Essentially, funding this document is pre-work before the full planning grant would be funded. There is no issue with the eligible match, as the Amelia County EDA purchased the site for approximately \$750k.

Once the Timmons proposal arrives, a second GO Virginia planning grant application will be prepared and submitted to DHCD GO Virginia staff for review and approval. The Timmons representatives estimate the additional work is in the range of \$20-25k.

To keep this project moving forward, the Executive Committee could approve a second application as outlined above, authorize the Program Director to do the necessary things to prepare the second application and submit it to DHCD GO Virginia staff. Based on this scenario, the Region 3 per capita funding would increase from \$100k to \$120-125k.

Amelia County Economic Development Authority (EDA) requested that Timmons Group provide an independent review of the above referenced site in conjunction with our market knowledge of prospective industries and economic development sites throughout the Southeast United States, in particular Virginia, in conjunction with the proposed NAICS Codes.

Amelia County EDA provided the following information for review by Timmons Group:

- Site Certification Report for Amelia County Richardson Road Site dated August 2022
- Richardson Road Boundary Survey dated October 2022
- Phase II ESA dated January 2023
- Conceptual Master Plan dated June 2023
- Regional Site Development Planning Grant Application dated September 2023

Site Overview:

The site is approximately 132 acres located on the north side of, and adjacent to, US 360 and approximately 5 miles west of Amelia Court House. The site is approximately 40 miles west of downtown Richmond and within a 30-45 min drive time of a significant potential workforce. According to 2022 VDOT traffic counts, there are approximately 13,800 vehicles per day that pass by the site.

Based upon the Conceptual Master Plan, the site can accommodate buildings ranging in size from 20,000 SF to 250,000 SF with a total potential of 1,018,000 SF at full build-out. The site currently does not have public water and sewer serving the site, however, public water and sewer facilities are located approximately 4 miles due east of the site towards Amelia Court House.

A review of the NAICS Codes in conjunction with the site assets and development potential indicates that the site could potentially work for all the NAICS codes listed above, with the following general exceptions:

- Mixed Mode Transit Systems and Commuter Rail Systems (485111, 485112)
- Pipeline Transport (486110 through 486990)
- Scenic and Sightseeing Transportation, Water (487210)
- Air Traffic Control or Other Airport Operations (488111, 488119)
- Port and Harbor Operations or Other Support Activities for Water Transportation (488310, 488390)
- Pulp Mills, Paper Mills & Paperboard Mills (322110, 322120, 322130)
- Petroleum Refineries (324110)

Please note these general exceptions represent only 16 of the potential 594 NAICS codes identified, or 2.7%.

It's important to note that the lack of public water and sewer facilities will limit the user base to domestic water and sewer users only and not industries that might need to rely on higher volumes of water usage.

Given the location of the site within Amelia County along the US 360 corridor and the fact it's located in Dominion Energy service territory, we would recommend Amelia County look at the potential costs to deliver public water and sewer utilities to the site. Delivery of these utilities to the site would create an opportunity for additional industries that might not otherwise consider the site.

Limitations of this review:

Please note that Timmons Group review was limited to the information provided by the Amelia County EDA and noted in this letter. No additional site studies, industry analysis or target market studies were completed to support this evaluation.

RE: Controlled Environment Agriculture_Advancing Virginia's Controlled Environment Agriculture Sector through Translational Research and Economic and Workforce Development

As presented in the Project Pipeline Report, I have been working closely with Dr. Scott Lowman (VP of Applied Research) at the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research (IALR) to bring this project to a point where combined implementation funding can be sought from GO Virginia, the Tobacco Region Revitalization Commission, and the US Economic Development Administration. The intent is to maximize each funder's grant programs and to maximize the use of leveraged match for the project's priorities. This implementation project is used as a guide to the <u>GO Virginia Region 3 CEA Strategy and Roadmap</u>.

A project summary has been prepared, which provides background information, goals, and project elements (priorities) to be implemented. This will be a comprehensive economic and workforce development initiative for the Region 3 Council in the coming years. The overarching goal is to use the Virginia Tech/Institute for Advanced Learning and Research's Controlled Environment Innovation Center as a hub to "...unlock the economic potential of CEA in Virginia by scaling up this emerging business sector statewide, supporting entrepreneurs, fostering talent pathways, and expanding industry support through translational research and development." Attached is a copy of the summary for your reference.

Because this project will likely deplete the remaining FY2023-2024 Per Capita balance (~\$600k) and, to a yet-to-be-determined degree, the FY2024-2025 Per Capita allocation (\$1MM), it will be essential to access the Statewide Competitive funding pool through a new procedure. Adopted by the GO Virginia State Board in December 2023, this new procedure allows single GO Virginia regions to submit transformative economic and workforce development for funding from the Statewide Competitive Pool. Before this new procedure, two (2) or more regions had to submit a joint implementation project. DHCD GO Virginia staff has been engaged and will assist the applicant and Region 3 Council to access this funding pool. There is no ceiling imposed for single-region projects.

It should be noted that the development of the project budget has been started, but an upcoming meeting with the project funders will better inform that work. A Region 3 Per Capita application is tentatively planned for review by the Region 3 Council at its meeting on July 17th. The Executive Committee will preview the project at its meeting on June 19th.

IALR has retained Virginia Tech's Center for Economic and Community Engagement staff to prepare the GO Virginia application. These staff members authored the Region 3 CEA Strategy and Roadmap. The IALR will prepare the Tobacco Region Revitalization Commission application, and the West Piedmont Planning District Commission will prepare the US Economic Development Administration on behalf of the IALR.

Virginia Tech/Institute for Advanced Learning and Research CEA Innovation Center



Advancing Virginia's Controlled Environment Agriculture Sector through Translational Research and Economic and Workforce Development

Introduction

Controlled Environment Agriculture (CEA) has been designated an "industry of the future" by many sources, including the <u>Virginia Economic Review</u> (p.43) in late 2021. While not a novel concept, CEA has been transformed by integrating cutting-edge technologies like robotics, data science, and highly efficient lighting. This transformation will reshape the landscape of food production, impacting local, regional, and state economies and influencing community health and workforce development. Beyond indoor vegetable cultivation alone, CEA encompasses diverse fields such as protein production through fermentation, aquaculture, mushroom cultivation, and cell culture.

In the Fall of 2023, Governor Youngkin spotlighted these emerging opportunities at <u>The Great Indoors</u> <u>Symposium</u> in Northern Virginia. The event underscored Virginia's pioneering national status as an economic development driver within the CEA sector, and it highlighted the strategic role played by the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center in Danville, Virginia.

Goals

This proposed project aims to unlock the economic potential of CEA in Virginia by scaling up this emerging business sector statewide, supporting entrepreneurs, fostering talent pathways, and expanding industry support through translational research and development. Aligned with the <u>CEA</u> <u>Strategy and Roadmap in GO Virginia Region 3</u>, the initiative focuses on four (4) key goals:

- Increase the number, success rate, and profitability of Virginia's CEA-related entrepreneurs, small businesses, and on-farm revenue-generating enterprises.
- Enhance the growth and job creation within Virginia's existing CEA firms, making the state a prime location for CEA business investment.
- Cultivate a pipeline of skilled individuals in CEA through comprehensive talent development programs that would include CEA-relevant credentials and increase enrollment in K-12, community college, undergraduate, and graduate-level students in CEA-related programs supplemented by internships, curricular instruction,

career awareness, and relevant work-based learning experiences.

 Position the translational research capabilities and reputation of the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center to enhance and increase its support of existing and emerging CEA businesses and reach a complementary portfolio of companies across their supply chains.







Strategic Activities

An expanded VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center will execute strategic activities including:

- Providing tailored entrepreneurship support to small agricultural businesses and budding entrepreneurs in partnership with the <u>SOVA Rise Collaborative</u>.
- Offering expanded translational research and technical assistance to CEA companies and their supply chain.
- Developing and implementing a comprehensive CEA talent pathway model in partnership with the <u>GO TEC</u> program.
- Developing and conducting awareness campaigns to educate potential stakeholders in the private and public sectors.
- Implementing a strategic economic development initiative to include:
 - developing and implementing a CEA marketing plan for the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center to support CEA business recruitment and retention for use by local and regional economic development organizations, the Virginia Economic Development Partnership, the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, and other aligned organizations;
 - developing an inventory and assessment of Southern Virginia's CEA-competitive business sites and existing buildings suitable for CEA production with a focus on the central business districts of Region 3's incorporated towns and cities and on-farm structures; and
 - developing and distributing model CEA-business site development and building reuse standards.

These goals will be achieved through multi-partner collaboration and will lead to the growth of the CEA sector in GO Virginia Region 3 and throughout Virginia.

The Foundation

Since its start in 2020, the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center has emerged as a pioneering model for collaborative innovation in the CEA sector. Using the IALR's unique platform as a state-affiliated entity, the Center bridges business, academic, economic development, and workforce development interests.

The Center's strategic partnership with Virginia Tech, particularly with the School of Plant and Environmental Sciences and the Department of Mechanical Engineering, provides CEA businesses unparalleled access to a diverse array of globally recognized subject matter experts and leading-edge translational research capabilities. Spanning over 46,000 square feet, the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center houses facilities encompassing laboratories, offices, and greenhouse spaces devoted to biology, chemistry, robotics, data science, and hydroponic research in plant science. Partnering companies benefit from a comprehensive suite of services, including IP-friendly and low-cost contract research, ISO chemistry testing, access to bench and greenhouse spaces, and experts for guidance.





While the above capabilities and partnerships highlight a competitive industry-focused research capacity, current small-scale internship programs, and entrepreneurship support are presently pilot-scaled and have tremendous room for growth. The Virginia Tech Center for Economic and Community Engagement helped develop the CEA Strategy and Roadmap in GO Virginia Region 3, which identified a number of strategic growth needs and opportunities.

Partnerships to Drive Growth and Ensure Success

Diverse partners from various sectors, including government agencies, educational institutions, and industry leaders, will be engaged to achieve the outlined goals and strategies. Potential partners include the Virginia Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Virginia Economic Development Partnership, CEA industry leaders, Virginia Tech, Virginia Cooperative Extension, Virginia State University, Virginia Innovation Partnership Corp., Virginia Bio, CvilleBioHub, The Verge Alliance, SOVA Rise Collaborative, the Virginia Community College System, the K-12 education system, federal agencies, and many more.

Through the active participation of these partners and others who will be enlisted, resources and support will be aligned to realize the first-mover potential of the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center for translational research and economic development.

Leadership and Organization

IALR's Vice President of Applied Research, <u>Dr. Scott Lowman</u>, will implement and manage this multifaceted project. A successful CEA entrepreneur himself, Dr. Lowman, in 2003, co-founded and led the development of one of the longest-standing and most successful private not-for-profit urban farms and job training centers in the United States, <u>Lynchburg Grows</u>. Aside from Lynchburg Grows, Dr. Lowman also led the development and launch of the <u>Plant Endophyte Research Center at IALR</u>, the <u>SPARK Innovation Center and Co-working Space</u> in Altavista, Virginia, and co-founded the <u>Virginia</u> <u>Tech/Institute for Advanced Learning and Research CEA Innovation Center</u>.

With the Center's other co-founder, <u>Dr. Mike Evans</u>, who serves as the Founding Director of Virginia Tech's School of Plant and Environmental Sciences and joined by Assistant Professor of Controlled Environment Agriculture, <u>Dr. Kaylee South</u>, a strong foundation of leadership is already in place.

A *CEA Advisory Board* will be empaneled with thought leaders from CEA businesses, economic development, entrepreneurship, research and development, workforce development, public sector leadership, and other aligned sectors to leverage industry, academia, and government expertise.

Standing workgroups focused on technical support, economic development, entrepreneurship, and workforce development will be organized to support the CEA Advisory Board in putting ideas into action. Principals from public, private, academic, and non-profit organizations in GO Virginia Region 3 and

elsewhere in Virginia will be identified and invited to join these standing workgroups, supplemented by other subject matter experts from elsewhere in Virginia.

The Virginia Tech Center for Community Engagement will provide technical support and assistance to Dr. Lowman and his IALR team, establishing and coordinating the CEA Advisory Board and its workgroups.







Funding Priorities

- <u>Entrepreneurship Support Program</u> to promote entrepreneurship across the CEA sector, including production, controls, structures, sensors, data management, business principals, marketing, access to capital, etc. Access to research space will be available for testing, and expertise in plant science will be available from various IALR and VT faculty. The SOVA Rise Collaborative as GO Virginia Region 3's entrepreneur ecosystem and other Virginia entrepreneur ecosystems will be engaged for expertise and support.
- <u>Workforce Development Program</u> to support coordination between K-12 school divisions, higher education institutions, and CEA businesses using a talent pathway approach for curriculum, career exploration, and skill and credential acquisition.
- <u>CEA Residency Program</u> for post-graduate students to obtain knowledge and experience at the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center. Accepted students will learn business principles and practices, interact with large and small CEA companies, and gain technical expertise. Upon program completion, these students will provide CEA companies with knowledgeable and skill-ready employees. Additionally, these students would be positioned to launch CEA start-up businesses based on the practical knowledge and industry contacts made during their residency. The overarching purpose of this program is to attract and retain highly skilled graduate-level CEA talent to support CEA business investment in Virginia.
- <u>CEA Business Recruitment and Retention Marketing Plan</u> to increase CEA business investment and leverage VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center as an industry-aligned asset.
- <u>CEA Business Ready Sites and Buildings Inventory and Prototype Strategy</u> to inventory and assess existing business sites and buildings in Region 3 suitable to support CEA business investments and develop a model site and existing structure prototype. Once completed, this study will help broaden the portfolio of targeted business sectors to include CEA for local, regional, and state economic developers.
- <u>VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center Measurement</u>, Assessment, and Continuous Improvement <u>Framework</u> to ensure that impacts are measured and assessed to achieve optimal program performance.
- <u>VT/IALR Innovation Center Expansion</u> of the existing labs, offices, and greenhouses, including equipment, to better position translational research and development services to meet industry growth and the evolving needs of the marketplace.
- <u>Enterprise Sustainability Plan</u> will be developed to create and maintain financial sustainability, which supports the annual operation and capital needs of the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center.

In addition to these priorities, complimentary funding from public, non-profit, academic, and private sector sources will be sought to identify and recruit additional skilled experts in technical areas not currently covered by the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center.





Conclusion

With a strategic foundation in place through the recently published *CEA Strategy and Roadmap in Go Virginia Region 3* and with the support of CEA business interests, governmental entities, academic

institutions, and non-profit organizations, increasing the programming and research capabilities of the VT/IALR CEA Innovation Center will demonstrate Virginia's strong commitment to grow its the CEA sector for sustained growth and prosperity.

RE: 2024 All Hands Meeting Cancellation and Reprogramming to Subregional Events

As previously shared with the Executive Committee, the challenges with organizing, financing, and delivering an All Hands meeting this year have caused a rethinking of this event. The development of the draft FY2024-2025 Region 3 Council operating budget has given the financial challenges better clarity and the talent and leadership needed to organize such an event left when Nancy Pool stepped down from Region 3 Council work.

An alternative with some potential to attract interest from Region 3's stakeholder communities would be to convene a smaller interactive/learning/networking event in each of the subregions yearly. The topics presented could be related to economic and workforce development but are not necessarily limited to these topics. Also, smaller events could use donated space, incur fewer costs, and enlist smaller dollar sponsorships by interests from each subregion.

There has been no planning beyond this high-level thinking. The Region 3 Council would be a ready source of ideas on the scope and scale of these events.

In light of the situation, I would like the Executive Committee's agreement for me to do the following:

- Advise the Region 3 Council that the 2024 All Hands scheduled for May 9th will not be held this year and that a new initiative will be launched to convene smaller interactive/learning/networking events in the Northern, Eastern, and Western Subregions.
- Advise the Region 3 Council that it will have an opportunity at the April or July meetings to discuss and brainstorm these events' topics, scope, and scale. This input will be used to develop an event plan.
- Communicate this decision to not hold the All Hands meeting to those individuals on the event distribution list, emphasizing that the GO Virginia Region 3 Council will be transitioning to smaller-scale events in each subregion.

RE: GO Virginia Region 3 Council 2024 Leadership Advance

The GO Virginia Region 3 Executive Committee and Council discussed its interest in convening a leadership meeting in 2024. This would be similar to one in 2018 when the Region 3 Council was organizing. It should be noted that the Growth & Diversification Plan provides strategic direction to the Region 3 Council.

This day-long event would allow members to get to know each other better and reflect on the Region 3 Council's work and role in Southern Virginia. It would be held at a location reasonably central in Region 3 drive-timewise.

RE: GO Virginia State Board (3.12.24) – Action on Region 3 Application

The GO Virginia State Board met on March 12th. Because there was no quorum among the members, the State Board could only discuss Region 3's pending projects: <u>Region 3 GO</u> <u>TEC Expansion, Pathway Pilot, and Welding Hub Development</u>.

The project will be acted upon when the GO Virginia State Board meets next, which should be in April.

The DHCD GO VA staff and State Board work group recommended reducing the award from \$489,381 to \$302,689.55. The reduction was for the following reasons:

- GO Virginia funds are intended as catalytic investments, which are then sustained by the project team; investment for new equipment for existing modules in existing labs raises concerns about sustainability.
- There is no cost-share proposed for the additional equipment.
- The welding packs included in the request do not create enduring new or expanded training capacity after the 88 students progress through the program and are not directly related to the primary project activity of the new Career Connection Labs.

The cut was not known until Friday, March 8th. A letter was prepared by the project principal, Dr. Julie Brown, which shared information that the welding packs had been mislabeled as "consumables" when Patrick & Henry Community College verified these items were "supplies" and thereby eligible for GO Virginia funding.

Attached is a copy of the GO State Board report and the letter from Dr. Brown for your reference.

I will be prepared to discuss this matter at the Executive Committee's meeting on March 20th.

Project Goal(s): To increase the pool of qualified candidates in targeted industries for GO Virginia Region 3

Project Description:

The project will add two new Career Connections labs, one in Henry County and one in Brunswick County. These new Career Connections labs will focus on advanced manufacturing and IT modules. This portion of the project comprises \$276,808 of the GO Virginia request for equipment, with \$240,278 of the matching funds proposed to go towards teacher salaries, classroom space, computer, and additional equipment and supplies.

The project will also add a 9th and 10th grade bridge pilot program in Henry County. This would attempt to bridge the gap between the current middle school GO TEC[®] programming and CTE education which occurs in 11th and 12th grade. This portion of the project is proposed to make up \$225,850 of the matching funds, with costs going towards equipment and supplies.

The project also proposes adding equipment used for currently taught modules in 16 middle schools with existing GO TEC career exploration labs. This would involve adding augmented reality welding equipment to the current curriculum and adding Arduino Uno units for the IT programming and coding curriculum to scaffold learning to the current Raspberry Pi units. This portion of the project comprises \$121,008 of the GO Virginia request.

In addition, the project proposes adding welding tools and supplies for up students at Patrick and Henry Community College. This work would build upon the College's recent expansion of their Manufacturing Engineering and Technology Complex, establishing P&HCC as

the region's welding hub. This portion of the project requests \$49,720 of GO Virginia funding to pay for welding packs consisting of PPE and welding supplies for 88 individual welding students. This portion of the project also proposes \$51,109 in matching funds (\$39,609 for equipment, \$11,500 for welding scholarships for tuition).

On the whole, GO Virginia funds will be used for grant administration, indirect costs, equipment, supplies, and outreach. Matching funds will be used for teacher salaries, supplies and equipment for the career connections labs, in-kind value of GO TEC classroom spaces, supplies and equipment for a 9th and 10th grade GO TEC pilot program in Henry County, and for welding equipment and scholarships for the Community College.

Based on the workgroup discussion and application review, staff **recommends this project for approval for \$302,689.55; this would be inclusive of the new career connections labs, the scope of work with establishing the 9th and 10th grade pilot programs, and indirect/administrative rates for the grantee and subgrantee.**

Dear Ms. Agee,

On behalf of the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research (IALR), I would like to thank you and the GO Virginia Board for your unwavering support of GO TEC[®] Virginia over the last several years. With your investment, matched through our partners including K12, higher education, local government and philanthropy, we have been able to expand GO TEC to four GO Virginia regions, providing career exposure in targeted industry sectors across 44 middle schools and developing a talent pipeline that has helped attract new businesses to the Commonwealth.

IALR's current Region 3 per capita request allows us to add two additional GO TEC middle school Career Connection labs and is focused on developing a welding hub in partnership with Patrick & Henry Community College (P&HCC), aligning to the GO TEC hub and spoke vision. Our understanding is that the requested 88 welding packs were cut from the funding recommendation since they were deemed as consumables. In our application, the items were incorrectly labeled. The welding packs requested for P&HCC welding students represent long lasting supplies, to be reused by future welding students. Welding packs will be loaned to welding students while they are enrolled in the program. With the exception of gloves, which will need to be replaced for new students, all items within the welding pack can be used for multiple semesters of students. Upon program completion, students will return the packs to the college. They will be individually inspected for any wear or missing items, new gloves will be added, and the packs will be loaned out to a new cohort of welding students. P&HCC anticipates that the welding packs can be used for at least three years before needing to be fully replaced.

On behalf of our GO TEC partners, IALR would like to request that the 88 welding packs be re-labelled as supplies, adding \$54,368.82 to the approved Region 3 per capita request for a total GO Virginia grant award of \$357,058.37. This investment will maintain the anticipated ROI with 56 individuals earning credentials with potential to enter the workforce upon completion.

On behalf of IALR and our Region 3 Partners, thank you for considering this request. Availability of the required supplies helps students in our economically distressed region enroll in the short-term training program whereby graduates can access employment in the Commonwealth.
